

#### **Those Other Women** - Nicola Moriarty


Poppy's world has tipped sideways: the husband who never wanted children has betrayed her with her broody best friend.

A rivalry that was once harmless fun is spiralling out of control. Because one of their members is a wolf in sheep's clothing. And she has an agenda of her own . . .





The relentlessly progressive paralysis of ALS begins in the cruellest way possible - in his hands. As Richard becomes more and more locked inside his body and can no longer play piano or live on his own, Karina steps in as his reluctant caregiver.

Paralysed in a different way, Karina is trapped within a prison of excuses and blame, stuck in an unfulfilling life as an after-school piano teacher, afraid to pursue the path she abandoned as a young woman. 





Her journey takes her into the darkest corners of India's underworld, on a harrowing cross-continental journey, and eventually to an apartment complex in Seattle. Alternating between the girls' perspectives as they face ruthless obstacles, *Girls Burn Brighter* introduces two heroines who never lose the hope that burns within them.





#### Scourged - Kevin Hearne




Someone has taken her little girl ...





Alex enlists the help of her close friend, art conservator John Porter, and together they sift through the clues and deceptions that swirl around the last days of Molly Dean.




#### Macbeth - Jo Nesbo

#### The Boat People - Sharon Bala



Instead, the group is thrown into a detention processing centre, with government officials and news headlines speculating that among the "boat people" are members of a separatist militant organisation responsible for countless suicide attacks—and that these terrorists now pose a threat to Canada's national security. 
#### The Last Equation of Isaac Severy – Nova Jacobs







#### Finding My Place - Anne Aly

In 2016, Anne Aly was the first Australian Muslim woman, the first Egyptianborn woman and the first counter-terrorism expert to be elected to Federal Parliament.

'What am I doing here?' she asked herself as she was sworn in with her hand on her father's copy of the Quran.

It's a question the former professor has raised more than once since she arrived in Australia aged two bearing the name Azza Mahmoud Fawzy El Housseini Ali Al Serougi. The answer is a fascinating and moving story of a Muslim girl growing up in suburban Australia in the seventies, when the Brady Bunch appeared to epitomise Western family life and girls like Anne danced the divide between the expectations and values of their parents' culture and that of their adopted land.





#### The Essence of You and Me - Kada & Barney Miller

As a 20-year-old, David 'Barney' Miller was one of the best surfers on Australia's mid-north coast. When a workmate lost control on a bend in the road, flipping their car and slamming into a tree, Barney was trapped in the wreckage. The accident left him a quadriplegic. He was told by doctors he would never breathe independently or be able to use his right arm or his legs again.

Refusing to give in, he defied all medical assessments through self-belief, hard work and sheer guts. But his surf dreams were ended and even with his determined efforts, he wasn't able to walk. Barney plunged into a depression many thought he wouldn't emerge from. Then he met Kada, a beautiful girl from a country town who dreamed of becoming a singer. Kada had moved to the coast to escape her own troubled life.

When Barney met Kada they fell in love. She didn't see his wheelchair, she saw the man he was. Barney saw everything Kada was and everything she could be. He made it his mission to only ask Kada to marry him when he could kneel down to propose, stand at the altar and dance together at their wedding.



#### The Friendship Cure - Kate Leaver

The basic compulsion to make friends is in our DNA; we've evolved, chimp-like, to seek out connection with other human beings. We move through life in packs and friendship circles and yet we are stuck in the greatest loneliness epidemic of our time. It's killing us, making us miserable and causing a public health crisis. But what if friendship is the solution, not the distraction?

Journalist Kate Leaver believes that friendship is the essential cure for the modern malaise of solitude, ignorance, ill health and angst. If we only treated camaraderie as a social priority, it could affect everything from our physical health and emotional well-being to our capacity to find a home, keep a job, get married, stay married, succeed, feed and understand ourselves.





#### Natural Causes: life, death and the illusion of control

- Barbara Ehrenreich

A razor-sharp polemic which offers an entirely new understanding of our bodies, ourselves, and our place in the universe, *Natural Causes* describes how we over-prepare and worry way too much about what is inevitable. One by one, Ehrenreich topples the shibboleths that guide our attempts to live a long, healthy life - from the importance of preventive medical screenings to the concepts of wellness and mindfulness, from dietary fads to fitness culture.

Drawing on varied sources, from personal experience and sociological trends to pop culture and current scientific literature, *Natural Causes* examines the ways in which we obsess over death, our bodies, and our health. Both funny and caustic, Ehrenreich then tackles the seemingly unsolvable problem of how we might better prepare ourselves for the end - while still revelling in the lives that remain to us.



How did we get from the Big Bang to today's staggering complexity, in which seven billion humans are connected into networks powerful enough to transform the planet? And why, in comparison, are our closest primate relatives reduced to near-extinction?

Big History creator David Christian gives the answers in a mind-expanding cosmological detective story told on the grandest possible scale. He traces how, during eight key thresholds, the right conditions have allowed new forms of complexity to arise, from stars to galaxies, Earth to homo sapiens, agriculture to fossil fuels. This last mega-innovation gave us an energy bonanza that brought huge benefits to mankind, yet also threatens to shake apart everything we have created.



The extraordinary true story of a violent ice trafficking syndicate that operated in northeast Victoria and southern New South Wales during 2012 and the police operation that cracked it.

When the young and impressionable sons and daughters of rural Australia were promised power and riches beyond their wildest dreams by an older sadistic boss, they became a highly manipulated and dangerous group of drug dealers. Intent on distributing their own brand of ice and justice into regional communities, they were prepared to attack anyone or anything that stood in their way. As the syndicate spirals out of control, their wildest dreams become their worst nightmares. Victorian detectives tracked and pursued the syndicate around the state in an attempt to stop the violence, collect evidence and dismantle the group.




#### The Art of Living Alone & Loving It - Jane Mathews







#### A White Hot Flame - Sue Taffe

Mary Montgomerie Bennett is an important but under-recognised figure in Australian history. A member of a successful squatting family, she became a voice for reform at a time when Aboriginal Australians had their citizens' rights curtailed by repressive state laws.

From her late forties until her death she fought for justice on behalf of the first Australians. She was a teacher, a writer, and an advocate. She vehemently opposed the separating, on racial grounds, of Aboriginal children from their families. She put the case, decades before campaigns began, for Aboriginal rights to traditional lands. And she argued for citizenship rights, including equal pay and access to old age pensions for Aboriginal people. A friend described her as 'a white hot flame', relentless in pursuit of a better world for the people she loved.




#### Couchsurfing in Iran - Stephan Orth

The author spends 62 days on the road in this mysterious Islamic republic to provide a revealing behind-the-scenes look at life in one of the world's most closed societies. Through the unsurpassed hospitality of his hosts, he skips the guidebooks and tourist attractions and travels from Persian carpet to bed to cot, covering more than 8,400 kilometres to recount this world's hidden doings. Experiencing daily what he calls the two Irans that coexist side by side - the theocracy, where people mourn their martyrs in mausoleums, and the hide-and-seek-cracy, where people hold secret parties and seek worldly thrills instead of spiritual bliss - he learns that Iranians have become experts in navigating around their country's strict laws.


Though couchsurfing is officially prohibited in Iran - the state fears spies would be able to travel undetected through the country - more than a 100,000 Iranians are registered with online couchsurfing portals. And thanks to these hospitable, English-speaking strangers, Orth gets up close and personal with locals to uncover the inner workings of a country where public show and private reality are strikingly opposed.






#### Leaf Supply - Lauren Camilleri & Sophia Kaplan






















## STAFF PICKS

I wonder if you will give them the same ratings?




#### Penric and the Shaman - Lois McMaster Bujold

This fantasy novella is set in the world of the Five Gods, the setting Lois McMaster Bujold has used for several of her other excellent fantasy novels. A fast, fun read, it follows Penric, a young Temple sorcerer, who has been assigned to help a law enforcement officer chase down a shaman accused of murdering his best friend. He's accompanied by his personal demon Desdemona, who insists on offering clever commentary at any opportunity - particularly when she grows bored — helped by her memories of the ten previous sorcerers she's been bound to, who were all women. As the pursuit stretches, it grows into a test for Penric's developing talents. He soon discovers that the situation is much more than it first appeared, and far greater powers may be meddling...






Lab Girl - Hope Jahren
